SUBJECT: Annual Immunization Status Reports now available

Annual immunization status reports (AISR) summarize the immunization data submitted by schools in your district for the 2012-13 school year. Summary reports are now available to download through the AISR application, follow the login information listed in the box below. Reports can be generated by school year for your school district and/or county by selecting *Reports* in the AISR application.

- Go to www.health.state.mn.us/immunize (Select *School Reporting Tool (AISR)* on the right)
- Enter the username: aisr1213
- Enter the password: school district number
(must be four digits; the exception is Minneapolis – which is S1)

This school year reflects the third year of collecting the number of children exempt to all vaccines. Overall, the statewide rate for exemptions to all vaccines in children entering kindergarten remained virtually unchanged at 1.6%. In addition, statewide school data once again show strong compliance with Minnesota's school immunization law which results in high immunization levels.

We know this couldn't have been achieved without the cooperation of health care providers, the support of parents, and the diligence and perseverance of the school nurses and your district's staff. Thank you for all your hard work.

We encourage you to review the report for your school district and compare your results to the statewide immunization compliance information.
